



## **Do you identify as a trans woman or are you a trans activist in Sweden?**

**Do you want to be part of a research project on trans women's citizenship in Sweden through a qualitative study of socio-legal status in family and workplace?**

Equal citizenship requires participation in society and access to resources. Citizenship thus requires social and legal recognition of people's status and needs. People who do not live according to binary gender system or do not abide to patriarchal gender roles have been excluded from equal participation in society and subjected to violence. By interviewing trans women and trans activist, this project attempts to answer the question of how trans women experience being recognized as partners, parents and workers in Swedish society?

The results of the project will be communicated to government actors, academics and activists in order to develop trans women's citizenship in reducing violence against trans women. The project is funded by the Research Council for Health, Working Life and Welfare (FORTE) and carried out by researcher at Örebro University.

The interview is voluntary and participants will be asked to answer questions about their experiences as a partner or parent and as a worker. The questions for trans women revolve around recognition of status and needs and how recognition or lack of recognition leads to violence and how activism for the protection of trans women's rights is shaped in Sweden. The interview takes about an hour and can be done in person or online. The study seeks to draw on the experiences of trans women and trans activists over the age of 18 and from different backgrounds.
